

Twenty-Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

GOSPEL READING

Today, we continue to read from the Gospel of Mark. Recall that last week we heard Jesus chastise his disciples for their argument about who among them was the greatest. Jesus taught them that the greatest among them will be those who serve the least ones. In today's Gospel, the disciple John questions Jesus about an unknown exorcist who was driving out demons in Jesus' name. John's question might have been motivated by jealousy. Previously in Mark's Gospel, Jesus healed a boy whom the disciples had been unable to heal. John's question is further evidence that the disciples have not yet grasped Jesus' words to them. They continue to compare themselves to others who seem to have greater healing powers, and they do not want to share the power of Jesus' name with others.

Today the demon possession described in the Gospels might be seen as a form of mental illness, but the need for healing these syndromes was as real then as it is now. Exorcism was a common practice in first-century Palestine. Some people had the power to heal the symptoms of possession. One of the strategies used was to invoke the name of a person or figure who was believed to have the power to heal.

The disciples observed that the unknown exorcist invoked Jesus' name and was successful in his healing efforts. This unknown healer recognized the power of Jesus' name, yet he was not a follower of Jesus. In his reply to his disciples, Jesus acknowledges that deeds of faith can precede the words of faith. He also teaches that the disciples should not be reluctant to share Jesus' healing powers with others.

Later in this Gospel, Jesus teaches us not to create obstacles for those who are just beginning to have faith but to encourage even the smallest signs of faith. The Greek word used here for sin also connotes "stumbling" or "causing scandal." In vivid terms Jesus teaches his disciples the consequences to those who would put obstacles before people who are on the road to faith.

Saints of the Week

Mon, Sep 30: St. Jerome, Priest and Doctor of the Church.
Jerome, died 420 at Bethlehem; from Dalmatia; devoted monk and ascetic; wrote numerous commentaries on and authored Latin ("Vulgate") translation of the Bible; one of the four great doctors of the Latin Church; patron of scripture scholars.

Tues, Oct 1: St. Thérèse of the Child Jesus, Virgin, Doctor of the Church.

Thérèse Martin, the "Little Flower," died September 30, 1897 of tuberculosis in the Carmel of Lisieux at age twenty-four born in Alençon; contemplative who, in her biography, *The Story of a Soul*, urged all to follow "the little way"; proclaimed doctor of the Church; patroness of the missions, of florists and of France.

Wed, Oct 2: The Holy Guardian Angels.

Observed since the 16th c. in Spain, Pope Clement X assigned this memorial to the first free day following Michaelmas day in 1670.

Fri, Oct 4: St. Francis of Assisi, Religious.

Francis, died October 3, 1226; noted for his charismatic personality, deep compassion for all, and love for God's creation; renounced wealth to follow "Lady Poverty". Son of a wealthy merchant, Francis' aimless adolescence ended when a failed military expedition led to his imprisonment and complete breakdown. Once home, Francis rediscovered God in the beauty of nature and the ugliness of human suffering, caring for lepers, praying in the little church of San Damiano, whose crucified Jesus he heard calling, "Repair my house, Francis, which is falling into ruins." Francis sold his possessions—and his father's—to fulfill this command. When his father objected, Francis disrobed: "I return the clothes, your name, and all you gave me: God alone is my Father now." Later, the pope would dream of a ragged friar stretching forth a single hand to prop up the crumbling papal Cathedral of Saint John Lateran. Francis indeed helped rebuild the universal Church, founding the Friars Minor (Franciscans), dying at a young forty-four, bearing the stigmata of the Christ whose living icon he remains—in the Church and far beyond it. Founded the Franciscan Family which is made up today of the Friars Minor (Capuchins [numbering 10,355 religious], Conventuals [c. 3,980 religious], and those of the Leonine Union [c. 12,475 religious]), Poor Clares, Third Order Religious, and the Secular Franciscan order; ; wrote *Canticle of the Sun*; received the stigmata September 14, 1224; canonized only two years after his death; patron of ecologists and of Italy.

Sat, Oct 5: St. Faustina Kowalska, Virgin; Blessed Francis Xavier Seelos, Priest (USA).

Venerated as the "Apostle of Divine Mercy," St. Maria Faustina Kowalska of the Blessed Sacrament was born in Glogowiec, Poland, on August 25, 1905. In 1928 , she professed her first religious vows in the Congregation of the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy. Beginning in 1924, and throughout her life, Faustina reported having visions of Jesus and conversations with him, which she noted in her diary later published as *The Diary of St. Maria Faustina Kowalska: Divine Mercy in My Soul*. On February 22, 1931, Faustina had a vision of Jesus who presented himself as the "King of Divine Mercy" wearing a white garment with red and pale rays coming from his heart. She died October 5, 1938. St. Faustina Kowalska was beatified April 18, 1993 and canonized April 30, 2000. Francis Xavier Seelos, born in Germany in 1819, Francis Xavier Seelos entered the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer and was sent to North America. Ordained a priest in 1844, he began his pastoral ministry in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania as assistant pastor of his confrère, St. John Neumann, serving also as Master of Novices and dedicating himself to preaching. He died in New Orleans on October 4, 1867.


